



In this group are represented seven races: Turkish, Arab, Greek, Egyptian, Syrian, Bedouin and American.






Oslo water creations

Oslo II, Annex III, Article 40
Agreed to by PLO and Gov't of Israel

Distribution of control of transboundary flows: 90-10

+ Palestinian Water Authority (PWA)

+ Joint Water Committee (JWC)







## THE HEGEMONIC APPARATUS

mix of Force + Consent

Force

< 1948 Land appropriation through irrigated farming (see Abu Sitta 2011)

Force

1967 Military Conquest → 3 military orders

1967–95 Occupation → water for settlers legitimised through water supplied to Palestinian villages

2001 onwards → Damages to water infrastructure

Consent


'Oslo II' Agreement → The Joint Water Committee
 "dressing up domination as cooperation" (Selby 2004)

Through JWC, PWA *still* legitimising settlement construction; PA consenting to its own colonisation (see Selby 2013)

Israeli position: Oslo 3


PLO position: Intn'l Water Law

Ways forward

Groundwork

Getting water to people

Hampered by PWA,

Legal Advocacy

HR to Water, IWL, IHL, etc.

Case made for an ICJ ruling on water. *Jus cogens* and coercion → invalidate Oslo

(but) PA would have to lead

It seems inevitable that the PA, both: will fail, will try nothing else

Boycott, Divestment, Sanctions

Israel exports about 780 Mm3/y of 'virtual' water

(Chapagain&Hoekstra App XVIII – 2)

Single State

very sensible, also from perspective of water resources





## CONCLUSIONS

#### A) Logic of Settler Colonialism

- Water is used to a) legitimise settler project, and b) enable population transfer
- This particular type of colonialisation is influenced by Zionism, food trade, and still-existing tensions within Israel about whether to colonize or separate...
  - → 'Israeli colonialism'
- PWA caught up in a hegemonic apparatus

#### **B)** Ways forward

- Many efforts to confront the water situation are obstructed by pretense of statehood and of equality
- PA double inevitability will fail and will try nothing else
- → communal work around the PA: groundwork, BDS, legal campaigns, single political entity

#### HR to Water:

recent UN GA declaration traction through UN Security Council traction through Committee on Social and Cultural Rights

#### International Humanitarian Law

Violations of 'Law of Belligerent Occupation' / settlements

→ ICC (Int Criminal Court)

#### International Water Law

inequitable and unreasonable

- → ICJ (Int Court Justice), through allies, or
- → Permanent Court of Arbitration (oPt can initiate)

#### Invalidity of Oslo II

jus cogens (since Oslo supports settlements) / coercion
